He is currently a member of the Executive Subcommittee of the Committee on Government Patent Policy of the Federal Council for Science and Technology, and Chairman of the Subcommittee on University Patent Policy. He served on the inter-agency committee which drafted the new patent section for the Federal Procurement Regulations. He recently served on the patent Task Force advising the Commission on Government Procurement and the committee assigned to draft the ERDA patent provisions.

In the past, he had been Patent Counsel to the National Institutes of Health; served on the Staff, Judge Advocate of the Air Force Systems Command, Washington, D. C.; was Assistant to the Chief Patent Advisor, Army Ordnance Tank Automotive Command, Detroit Arsenal, Warren, Michigan; and was a Patent Examiner in the United States Patent Office.

Resume of Norman J. Latker

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I was born and raised in Chicago, Illinois where I attended the public schools through high school.

I received my Bachelor of Science degree in Civil Engineering from in the University of Illinois in June, 1953. During my four years of undergraduate work, I was on the Dean's List for two years. I was also accepted as a member of the honorary Civil Engineering Fraternity, Chi Epsilon: Annaky Civil Engineer Society

I received my LLB from the University of Illinois in June, 1956. My last year of law school was taken at Northwestern University. Credits earned at Northwestern were transferred back to the University of Illinois. (I was given the choice of obtaining my $Se_{c}f_{U}$, LLB from either Illinois or Northwestern.)

Since leaving law school, I have taken additional courses in AIN Nulle electricity, electronics, transistors, organic chemistry, and advanced organic chemistry. I am now attending classes in biochemistry. I also had attended the three week Judge Advocate General's Procurement Law Course at the University of Virginia in October, 1961. I scored second in the final exams that term.

With the exception of a three-month period after law school with the Chicago general law firm of Friedman, Zoline and Rosenfeld, all my professional experience has been gained with the Federal Government.

This began on October 4, 1956, as a GS-7 with the United States Patent Office. As a patent examiner, my duties entailed the examining of patent applications submitted to the Patent Office. The applications pertained, in the main, to structures involving measuring and testing equipment (thermostatic controls, thermocouples, rate of speed indicators, side slip indicators, etc.), acoustics, geometrical instruments, circuit makers and breakers, wooden, metallic, masonry, and concrete buildings. I left the Patent Office as a GS-11 in June, 1960 to take a GS-12 position as Assistant to the Chief Patent Advisor at the Army Ordnance Tank-Automotive Command, Detroit Arsenal, Warren, Michigan. In August, 1960 I became registered Patent Attorney Number 19,963. My duties at the Detroit Arsenal entailed the preparation and prosecution of patent applications for employees and contractors employed by the Detroit Arsenal, the rendering of opinions on infringement claims, royalty investigations, copyrights, resolving questions pertaining to the acquisition and use of technical data, surveillance of contracts to insure use of proper patent and data clauses, drafting of patent and data clauses for Arsenal contracts and evaluation and disposition of inventions reported to the Arsenal. I left the Detroit Arsenal as a GS-13 in March, 1962 for a GS-13 position on the Staff Judge Advocate at the Headquarters, Air Force Systems Command, Andrews Air Force Base, Washington, D. C.

My duties with the Staff Judge Advocate entailed responsibility for drafting Section 9, "Patents and Data," of the Air Force Procurement Instructions, processing deviations of Section 9 of ASPR, surveillance of contracts to insure use of proper patent and data clauses, staff visits to all AFSC Divisions and Centers to advise legal and procurement personnel, royalty and infringe investigations, investigations of claims of misappropriation of ideas, data or trade secrets, coordination of drafts of new regulations which dealt with patents or technical data, copyrights, and review of evaluations and dispositions of all inventions reported to the Divisions and Centers of the AFSC. I further served on an Ad Hoc committee, "Data Management Working Group," instituted at the direction of General Schriever to solve technical data problems. On September 11, 1963, I left the Air Force Systems Command to take a GS-14 position as the National Institutes of Health's Patent Advisor.

My duties at the NIH now entail serving as Patent Officer for the NIH, advising or representing the Director and Executive Officer in providing leadership for the NIH patent activities, including presentation of the NIH needs and views to the OSG and OS and the resolution of complex and controversial issues; establishing procedures, criteria, and internal policies consistent with existing Department policies, rules and regulations for the disposition of approximately 350 invention reports made each year by employees, research grantees, and research contractors; furnishing patent advice to individual employee or grantee inventors and contractors; preparing, reviewing, and advising on specific patent documents affecting ownership and disposition of the above 350 employee, research grant, and contract inventions; arranging for protection (including patenting and patent searches) of inventions; management of the NIH patent prosecution docket (The NIH has approximately 60

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patent applications pending before the U. S. Patent Office, all of which have been filed within the last three years.); surveillance of contracts to insure use of proper patent and data clauses; and drafting and negotiating patent and data clauses for inclusion in research contracts. I am also the present Department representative on the Data and Analysis Subcommittee of the President's Patent Advisory Panel.

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While at the Detroit Arsenal, I received three incentive awards from Army Ordnance for suggestions pertaining to improvement of the patent branch of the legal department. I also wrote a handbook entitled "Why Patents" which I believe is still in use at the Detroit Arsenal.

While with the AFSC, my article "Technical Data in the AFSC" was published in the Fall, 1962 edition of the Federal Bar Journal.

While at the NIH, my article "Utilization of Government-Owned Health and Welfare Inventions" was published in the November, 1965 edition of the Journal of the Patent Office Society.

I am presently a member of the ABA, FBA, and the Government Patent Lawyers Association.
