Dear Mr. Norris:

You indicated an interest in the "Small Business and Non-Profit Organization Patent Procedures Act", which I mentioned in my talk at the technology transfer symposium last Thursday.

Enclosed is a draft copy of a late version (9/6/78) of the bill. It was introduced on September 13, 1978 as S.3496. A sectional analysis of the bill, a background paper, and a copy of the September 13 Congressional Record are also enclosed. The latter makes some particularly persuasive arguments relating to our country's decline in technological leadership.

I and a large number of my counterparts in other educational institutions are greatly disturbed by the death-like grasp the Federal government asserts over research results to the detriment of the public utilization of these results and of economic growth in the private sector. If there is any way we can cooperate to achieve common goals, I would be happy to discuss it with you.
