Senators Bayh and Long have agreed that floor debate on S. 414 (Universities and Small Business Patent Procedures Act) will take place on Wednesday, April 23, 1980. Action on the first Budget Resolution may interfere with or interrupt the schedule. In any case, the time to contact Senators is now.

Long is reported to have an amendment that would vest title with the government and give 5 years exclusive license to universities and small businesses. This compares unfavorably with S. 414 which vests title with universities and small businesses. They, in turn, may grant exclusive licenses to big businesses for 5 years and to small businesses for 17 years. This information on the Long amendment is intended as background. Until we know more about Long's intentions, we should not confuse the request for Senate support.

House and Senate Budget Resolutions

In Health Manpower, the 1980 appropriation is approximately \$500 million, (for all health professions). The President's budget calls for \$100 million recissions and the Budget Committees assume these recissions. In '81, the President and the Budget Committees provide only \$350 million for all health manpower programs. Congressional staff warn that once these funds are lost, they will be extremely difficult, if not impossible, to regain. A low budget ceiling, coupled with Budget Committee action may destroy any hope of adequate health manpower funding.
