I wish to commend your stand regarding the subject of Patent Policy Versus Innovation that appeared in the Congressional Record on Friday, July 21, 1978. Mr. William Carey's editorial hit the nail on the head and it is fortunate that people like yourself have given it some recognition. Both Presidents Kennedy and Nixon recognized that the government's policy with regard to the handling of patents was counter-productive and they made policy statements trying to correct the situation. These pronouncements have been largely if not totally ignored.

At the risk of encroaching in your time, I should like to enclose a copy of a letter I wrote Mr. Robert Bartley of The Wall Street Journal back in 1974. I wrote in regard to an article by Edward E. It is easy to speak in bombastic terms of "government giveaways" of patent rights and the "Santa Claus" role of the federal government without being belabored by the facts.
